A Sample Statement to Guide Your Ministry's Mission and Approach

Introduction

Our church believes that marriage is established by God and should be supported through biblical teaching, intentional discipleship, practical resources, compassionate pastoral care, and appropriate professional support.

The Marriage Ministry exists to strengthen husbands and wives, equip couples for lifelong growth, support families, develop ministry-minded couples, and help marriages contribute to the spiritual health and mission of the local church.

This philosophy statement provides a framework for the ministry's purpose, values, leadership, teaching, programming, participant care, and evaluation. It is intended to guide decisions and help the church maintain a consistent, responsible, and biblically grounded approach to marriage ministry.

Our Foundational Belief

We believe marriage is a covenant relationship established by God.

Marriage should reflect:

- Faithfulness
- Commitment
- Biblical responsibility
- Sacrificial care
- Respect
- Unity
- Spiritual growth
- Purpose
- Service
- Accountability to God

We believe that husbands and wives benefit from clear biblical instruction, practical application, honest reflection, healthy communication, and ongoing encouragement.

We also recognize that couples enter marriage ministry with different:

- Backgrounds
- Experiences
- Strengths
- Challenges
- Expectations
- Levels of spiritual maturity
- Stages of marriage
- Family responsibilities
- Support needs
- Levels of ministry readiness

Our ministry will therefore seek to provide structured support while avoiding a one-size-fits-all approach.

Our Mission

The mission of the Marriage Ministry is to provide biblically grounded instruction, practical tools, supportive experiences, and ministry pathways that help couples strengthen their marriages, grow in spiritual maturity, discover God's purpose, and serve faithfully together.

Our Vision

We envision a church in which:

- Couples receive support before serious problems develop
- Marriage enrichment is part of ongoing discipleship
- Strong marriages contribute to stronger families

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Our Ministry Purpose

The Marriage Ministry exists to:

- Teach biblical principles related to marriage
 - Help husbands and wives better understand one another
 - Strengthen communication and partnership
 - Encourage personal responsibility and spiritual growth
 - Support couples at different stages of marriage
 - Provide practical assessments, lessons, and planning tools
 - Prepare couples for ministry and service
 - Develop marriage ministry leaders and facilitators
 - Connect couples with pastoral or professional support when needed
 - Build a sustainable church-based marriage ministry
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Our Core Values

Biblical Grounding

We will seek to ensure that ministry teaching, resources, and practices are consistent with Scripture and aligned with the church's theological leadership.

Biblical principles will guide the ministry's:

- Accountability
- Evaluation

We will distinguish between biblical instruction and personal opinion.

We will not present cultural preferences, facilitator experiences, or individual interpretations as universal biblical commands.

Christ-Centered Ministry

We believe that marriage ministry should direct couples toward spiritual maturity and faithful discipleship.

The ministry will encourage couples to:

- Seek God's wisdom
- Study Scripture
- Pray
- Practice humility
- Accept personal responsibility
- Demonstrate grace

- Pursue reconciliation when appropriate
- Grow in faithfulness
- Serve God through their marriage

The ministry will not present marriage as an end in itself. Marriage should contribute to the spiritual growth, family responsibility, and Kingdom service of the couple.

Marriage Enrichment

We believe marriage ministry should not be limited to couples experiencing crisis.

The ministry will support couples who desire to:

- Strengthen an already healthy marriage
- Improve communication
- Increase understanding
- Prepare for life transitions
- Discover shared purpose
- Develop spiritual unity
- Build stronger habits
- Prepare for service
- Continue growing over time

We will communicate that participation in marriage ministry is an investment in growth, not an admission of failure.

Prevention and Early Support

We believe churches should support couples before difficulties become severe.

The ministry will provide:

- Biblical instruction
- Marriage education
- Assessments

- Workshops
- Small groups
- Couple discussions
- Planning tools
- Pastoral guidance
- Referrals when appropriate

Early support can help couples identify concerns, strengthen healthy patterns, and seek assistance before problems become more destructive.

Practical Application

We believe couples need more than information. Teaching should lead to observable application.

The ministry will help couples:

- Identify specific behaviors
- Practice communication skills
- Complete assessments
- Develop action plans
- Discuss decisions
- Establish goals
- Apply biblical principles
- Evaluate progress
- Take realistic next steps

Each ministry experience should clearly explain what participants are expected to understand and how they can apply it.

Personal Responsibility

We believe meaningful growth begins when individuals examine their own attitudes, choices, communication, and behavior.

Participants will be encouraged to ask:

- What can I learn?
- What responsibility belongs to me?
- What behavior can I change?
- What can I communicate more clearly?
- What action can I take?
- What support do I need?
- How can I apply the biblical principle?

Marriage ministry should not become a setting where spouses publicly blame, shame, or diagnose one another.

Respectful Communication

We believe participants should be treated with dignity.

The ministry will promote communication that is:

- Honest
- Respectful
- Clear
- Patient
- Responsible
- Nonthreatening
- Free from humiliation
- Focused on understanding
- Appropriate to the setting

Public criticism, insults, intimidation, mocking, and aggressive confrontation will not be accepted in ministry activities.

Couple Privacy

We believe couples should control what they choose to share.

Participants will not be required to disclose:

- Private conflicts
- Sexual concerns
- Financial information
- Trauma
- Infidelity
- Mental health concerns
- Abuse
- Legal matters
- Counseling history
- Assessment results

Discussion activities should focus on principles and application without forcing public disclosure.

Confidentiality

We believe confidentiality is necessary for trust. Information shared within marriage ministry settings should be protected according to church policy.

Participants and leaders should not:

- Repeat another couple's personal story
- Share assessment results without permission
- Discuss private conversations outside the ministry setting
- Use information for gossip

- Post participant information online
- Disclose identifying details during public prayer without consent

Confidentiality cannot be promised when there are concerns involving:

- Child abuse
 - Domestic violence
 - Sexual abuse
 - Threats of harm
 - Suicidal statements
 - Immediate danger
 - Mandatory reporting requirements
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Safety

We believe participant safety takes priority over preserving the appearance of marital harmony. The ministry will not advise a person to remain in immediate danger.

Leaders will follow church procedures when concerns involve:

- Physical violence
- Threats
- Coercive control
- Sexual abuse
- Child abuse
- Stalking
- Serious intimidation
- Suicidal behavior
- Destruction of property
- Weapons during conflict
- Immediate safety risks

Marriage ministry will not attempt to privately manage serious safety concerns without appropriate pastoral, professional, legal, or emergency support.

Compassion

We believe couples should be treated with care rather than shame.

Participants may be experiencing:

- Communication difficulties
- Financial pressure
- Parenting stress
- Grief
- Illness
- Infidelity
- Separation
- Emotional distress
- Family conflict
- Major transitions

The ministry will respond with:

- Compassion
- Wisdom
- Appropriate boundaries
- Prayer
- Pastoral support
- Professional referrals
- Respect for participant dignity

Compassion does not require leaders to ignore harmful behavior or avoid necessary intervention.

Appropriate Referral

We believe marriage education, pastoral care, coaching, and professional counseling serve different purposes. The ministry will not present facilitators as counselors unless they possess appropriate professional qualifications.

Participants may be referred for specialized support involving:

- Abuse
- Addiction
- Trauma
- Severe depression
- Suicidal thoughts
- Chronic infidelity
- Serious mental health concerns
- Legal conflict
- High-conflict separation
- Persistent destructive communication
- Complex sexual concerns

The church should maintain a current referral list of qualified professionals and community resources.

Accessibility

We believe marriage ministry should be accessible to churches and couples with different levels of financial, organizational, and leadership capacity.

The ministry will seek to provide scalable options for:

- Small churches
- Growing churches
- Churches with limited budgets
- Churches without formal marriage ministries

- Churches with volunteer leadership
- Larger churches
- Multisite churches
- Community-based ministry settings

Possible access options may include:

- Free downloadable resources
- Low-cost assessments
- Participant-purchased books
- Volunteer-led studies
- Digital materials
- Short introductory programs
- Guided implementation
- Facilitator training
- Church partnership support

Our guiding principle is: Start where your church is. Build what your church needs. Grow as your ministry develops.

Cultural Awareness

We recognize that participants may come from different:

Facilitators should avoid stereotypes and assumptions. The ministry will seek to apply biblical principles with sensitivity, clarity, and respect while remaining consistent with the church's theological framework.

Assessments will be used as discussion and development tools, not as diagnoses or judgments.

Instruction

The ministry may provide instruction through:

Application

Participants will be encouraged to apply learning through:

- Discussion
- Reflection
- Couple exercises

- Action plans

- Strategic planning
- Follow-up activities

Support

The ministry may provide:

- Pastoral support
- Facilitated discussion
- Couple mentoring
- Resource recommendations
- Referral assistance

Our Teaching Philosophy

Marriage ministry teaching should be:

- Biblically grounded
- Clearly organized
- Easy to understand
- Practical
- Relevant
- Respectful
- Focused on application
- Appropriate to the audience
- Connected to measurable objectives

Each lesson should include:

- An essential question
 - A learning objective
 - Biblical instruction
 - Clear explanation
 - Modeling or examples
 - Guided discussion
 - Couple application
 - An assessment of understanding
 - Feedback
 - A practical next step
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Our Small-Group Philosophy

Marriage small groups should create structured opportunities for learning, reflection, and encouragement.

Small-group facilitators will:

- Prepare before each meeting
- Explain group expectations
- Protect privacy
- Encourage balanced participation
- Redirect harmful conversation
- Avoid forcing disclosure
- Manage time
- Maintain boundaries
- Communicate concerns appropriately
- Provide practical application

Small groups will not be used as public counseling sessions. Couples will not be pressured to expose private marital problems before the group.

Our Facilitator Philosophy

Facilitators do not need to be professional counselors, but they should be:

- Spiritually mature
- Dependable
- Teachable
- Respectful
- Prepared
- Emotionally responsible
- Supportive of church leadership
- Able to maintain confidentiality

- Aware of their limitations
- Willing to refer concerns appropriately

Facilitators should guide rather than dominate. Their responsibility is to help participants engage with the material, not to present themselves as having perfect marriages or complete answers.

Our Approach to Assessments

Marriage assessments should support understanding and conversation.

Assessments should not be used to:

- Label participants permanently
- Excuse harmful behavior
- Prove one spouse is correct
- Rank husbands or wives
- Shame participants
- Replace direct communication
- Replace pastoral care
- Replace counseling

Assessment results should generally remain private.

Participants may choose what they want to discuss with:

- Their spouse
 - A pastor
 - A facilitator
 - A counselor
 - A coach
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Our Approach to Couple Differences

We believe differences between husbands and wives can be discussed without treating either spouse as inferior.

Couples may differ in:

- Communication
- Decision-making
- Emotional expression
- Conflict response
- Personal preferences
- Strengths
- Gifts
- Life experiences
- Ministry interests
- Levels of readiness

The ministry will help couples understand differences, communicate responsibly, and pursue unity without requiring sameness.

Our Approach to Conflict

Conflict is not automatically evidence that a marriage has failed.

The ministry will help couples learn to:

- Identify the issue clearly
- Listen without interrupting
- Speak respectfully
- Avoid insults
- Separate facts from assumptions
- Accept responsibility
- Seek understanding

- Establish appropriate boundaries
- Identify practical next steps
- Request help when needed

The ministry will not treat abuse, intimidation, coercion, or threats as ordinary marital conflict.

Our Approach to Purpose

We believe marriage can serve a purpose beyond personal satisfaction.

Couples may be helped to explore:

Our Approach to Marriage Crisis

Marriage ministry may support couples experiencing difficulty, but the ministry must operate within appropriate limits.

When serious concerns arise, leaders will seek to:

- Protect safety
- Maintain dignity

- Avoid public exposure
- Involve pastoral leadership
- Follow reporting requirements
- Recommend professional support
- Provide appropriate referrals
- Document only necessary information
- Follow up responsibly

The ministry will not guarantee reconciliation in every situation. The ministry will not pressure participants to remain in unsafe circumstances.

Our Approach to Separation and Divorce

Couples experiencing separation or divorce should be treated with compassion and respect. Church leadership will determine the appropriate theological and pastoral response.

Marriage ministry leaders should not:

- Provide legal advice
- Pressure participants to disclose details publicly
- Take sides without sufficient information
- Promise a specific outcome
- Minimize safety concerns
- Interfere with professional treatment
- Ignore court orders
- Attempt to mediate high-risk situations without qualification

Appropriate support may include:

- Pastoral care
- Prayer
- Counseling referral

- Support resources
 - Safety planning
 - Family assistance
 - Individual discipleship
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Our Approach to Premarital Ministry

Premarital preparation should help engaged couples examine:

- Biblical expectations
- Communication
- Conflict
- Finances
- Family relationships
- Decision-making
- Intimacy
- Spiritual life
- Purpose
- Children
- Roles and responsibilities
- Support systems

Premarital ministry should help couples identify concerns before marriage and seek appropriate guidance. It should not be treated as a guarantee of future marital success.

Our Approach to Ministry Growth

Marriage ministry should grow according to the church's capacity.

A church may begin with:

- One leader

- One coordinating couple
- One assessment
- One workshop
- One study
- One small group
- One annual event

As capacity develops, the ministry may add:

- Additional facilitators
- Husband and wife studies
- Couple mentoring
- Retreats
- Premarital preparation
- Leadership development
- Purpose-based programs
- Annual planning
- Ministry evaluation
- Church partnership

Growth should not occur faster than the church's ability to provide responsible leadership, follow-up, and participant care.

- Trains additional leaders
- Expands resource offerings
- Establishes follow-up
- Develops an annual calendar

Stage Four: Sustainability

The church:

- Maintains leadership accountability
- Offers ongoing marriage development
- Evaluates outcomes

- Develops ministry-minded couples
- Provides scalable support
- Integrates marriage ministry with the church's mission

Ministry Program Standards

Every marriage ministry program should have:

- A clear purpose
- Pastoral approval
- A defined audience
- Qualified or prepared leadership
- Biblical content
- Practical application
- Participant expectations
- Safety procedures
- Confidentiality guidelines
- Referral procedures
- Evaluation
- Follow-up
- A clear next step

Ministry Decision Filter

Before offering a program or resource, leaders should ask:

- Is it biblically consistent?
- Does it support the ministry's mission?
- Is it appropriate for the intended audience?
- Is the church prepared to lead it responsibly?

- Are facilitators adequately prepared?
 - Are participant expectations clear?
 - Are safety and referral procedures established?
 - Is the cost manageable?
 - Can the church provide follow-up?
 - Is there a clear outcome?
 - How will the program be evaluated?
 - What is the next step for participants?
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Ministry Leadership Commitments

Marriage ministry leaders commit to:

- Honor biblical truth
- Respect pastoral authority
- Prepare thoroughly
- Protect participant dignity
- Maintain appropriate confidentiality
- Avoid public humiliation
- Communicate clearly
- Use resources responsibly
- Recognize personal limitations
- Seek help when needed
- Make appropriate referrals
- Follow church policies
- Evaluate ministry effectiveness
- Continue learning
- Serve with humility

Participant Commitments

Participants may be asked to commit to:

- Attend consistently
- Participate respectfully
- Protect group confidentiality
- Avoid public criticism of a spouse
- Complete assigned activities
- Focus on personal responsibility
- Seek clarification when needed
- Request additional support appropriately
- Respect facilitator boundaries
- Apply learning within the marriage

Sample Marriage Ministry Philosophy Statement

Our Marriage Ministry is committed to strengthening marriages through biblically grounded instruction, practical resources, intentional discipleship, responsible leadership, and compassionate support.

We believe marriage is established by God and that husbands and wives benefit from ongoing opportunities to grow in understanding, communication, spiritual maturity, purpose, and service.
